# Dear members, affiliate members, partners, and key stakeholders!

It is also **National Recovery Month**. Again, my heartfelt thanks to all of you who have helped people find recovery and to all people that are in recovery that serve such a crucial role as peers in our state.

Lastly it is **Hispanic Heritage Month**, and I am thankful for the efforts of our Racial, Equity, and Leadership Committee (REL) as well as our Hispanic members who help in providing culturally and linguistically appropriate services for all. As I write this we just learned that **Jay Chaudhary**, Director of Indiana Division of Mental Health and Addiction and the Chair of the Governor's Behavioral Health Commission, will be leaving this role effective October 11, 2024. I want to take a moment to recognize Jay in his role at DMHA and with the commission. Through his leadership we were able to see through SB 1 that set the foundation for Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics and Crisis Services within our system. Jay was the Indiana Council's Mental Health Advocate of the Year in 2023 for his work. I am forever grateful for his collaboration and support.



While we are in the midst of state transition it is critical for us to be

One of the most impactful rules that just rolled out this week is **Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act (MHPAEA)**. # Grant Update

### A lot of great news regarding our grants.

- The group home grant has provided over \$2.5 million dollars to our centers to both renovate existing group homes and the purchase of new buildings to increase and preserve bed capacity.
- The REL grant has reached its end, and the last claim has been filed for those funds.
- Bridge grant funds continue to be issued on a quarterly basis, and COVID grant funds are being claimed and issued monthly.
- We hope to share some news regarding the Humana grant soon, as it will provide funding for center employees who work with our aging population in Indiana.

We continue to keep you posted of any new grant opportunities, and advocate for funding for our centers. We hope everyone has a great end of the summer and start of the fall!

As a member of Regional Care Group, our purpose is to provide affordable care to all people regardless of age, income or circumstance. We are Indiana's largest and most comprehensive network of community-based healthcare and social services. Our organizations are here for individuals and families for all seasons of life.

As a network of human service organizations, Regional Care Group offers integrated care – a one-stop shop for health care and social services across an individual's lifespan. Despite our expansion in scope and scale, we haven't lost sight of what matters. In simple terms, we walk alongside people in their life journey – providing support and compassion.

Regional Care Group also includes **Geminus** and **Lake Park Residential Care**. Geminus provides social services to children and families. Lake Park Residential Care provides assisted living and housing to homeless and low-income adults coping with complex and severe mental health issues.

Our Continuum of Care connects community members with the care and assistance they need to get through life. Head Start children can receive care at one of our eight health care locations or catch the mobile clinic when it stops by. The mobile clinic offers health screenings, lab work and dental services. Health care staff assist with the needs of residents in the assisted living program. Every part of our organization connects and strengthens each other.

Regional Health Systems is constantly trying to better itself for the needs of our community. We introduced a residency program three years ago to help train future providers in our field. Last year, our mobile clinic made its debut to the public. This year our doors opened to a new crisis receiving unit.

As Northwest Indiana grows and new needs are demanded, Regional Health Systems will continue to expand. We are dedicated to providing care today, for better tomorrows.

### Building the Future of Mental Health Care: Regional Health Systems Launches Northwest Indiana's First Psychiatry Residency Program

In a bold move to tackle the mental health crisis in Northwest Indiana, Regional Health Systems, in partnership with Indiana University School of Medicine and the Northwest Indiana Graduate Medical Education Consortium, launched the region's first psychiatry residency program.

This program directly addresses the critical shortage of mental health professionals in the area, which has been designated by the United States Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) as a high-needs region for mental health care.

The residency program is already making a tangible difference. Regional Health Systems has recruited 14 residents, who are being immersed in comprehensive training across various psychiatric disciplines, including inpatient care, addictions, child and adolescent mental health, and primary care. With

three cohorts of resident students at Reginoal Health Systems, the first group is set to graduate in 2026. What sets this program apart is its handson approach, allowing residents to follow patients throughout their care, equipping them with the experience to manage complex, long-term psychiatric conditions.

"This program is not just about training doctors—it's about creating lasting change in the way mental health is addressed in our community," said Bill Trowbridge, CEO of Regional Health Systems. "We're building a pipeline of highly skilled psychiatrists who will

serve our most vulnerable populations and ensure that everyone, no matter their circumstances, has access to the care they need."

Dr. Kobie Douglas, Chief Medical Officer and residency director at Regional Health Systems, emphasized the life-saving impact this program will have. "We understand that depression, addiction, and trauma can be fatal. This program allows us to train young doctors to intervene at critical moments and save lives."

This psychiatry residency program is more than just an educational initiative—it represents a significant step toward addressing the long-term public health needs of the region's most underserved communities. By expanding residency opportunities locally, Regional Health Systems is not only building a stronger mental health workforce but also ensuring that many of these new psychiatrists will stay in the area, reducing disparities in access to care.

Through this initiative, Regional Health Systems continues to lead the charge in transforming mental health care in Northwest Indiana, making a positive, lasting impact on the community.

### Immediate Care, Lasting Impact: Regional Health Systems Launches Crisis C.A.R.E. Unit to Transform Mental Health Support

On July 16, 2024, Regional Health Systems took a bold step in transforming mental health care in Northwest Indiana with the launch of its innovative Crisis C.A.R.E. Unit at the Merrillville Care Center.

This new facility, which has been in development for over a year and a half, provides immediate, life-saving support to individuals experiencing a mental health crisis.

"The Crisis C.A.R.E. Unit is a game-changer," said **Bill Trowbridge, CEO of Regional Health Systems**. "Instead of waiting for an appointment, anyone in crisis can walk in and receive immediate care, just like an urgent care center—but specifically for mental health emergencies. Whether someone is dealing with a serious mental health crisis or just needs help getting through a tough time, they can come here and get help on the spot. This will transform the landscape of mental health care in our community."

Regional Health Systems has long been a leading force in Lake County's Crisis Intervention Team (CIT), working closely with local law enforcement to address mental health emergencies more effectively. The Crisis C.A.R.E. Unit is a natural extension of this partnership, providing a crucial resource that meets the needs of both the community and law enforcement. By offering a safe, welcoming space for those in crisis, the unit helps to decriminalize mental health, giving officers an alternative to jail or emergency rooms.

Angela Comsa, Chief Clinical Officer, emphasized the importance of this new resource. "Finally, we have a warm, welcoming place where people can turn in their most vulnerable moments. No more worrying about whether to take them to a hospital or call the



police—now, there's a better option. This partnership will ensure that those in crisis get the help they need,

without the stigma or criminalization that too often accompanies mental health issues."

The Crisis C.A.R.E. Unit is set to become a cornerstone of mental health care in the region, offering immediate, compassionate support while strengthening the collaboration between mental health providers and law enforcement to create lasting, positive change in the community.

### Partnering for Brighter Futures: Regional Health Systems and Geminus Head Start Unite for Children's Mental Health

At Regional Health Systems, nurturing the growth, development, and mental health of children is at the heart of what we do. Like us, Geminus Head Start has a shared commitment to children's wellbeing.

A collaboration between the two entities brings vital mental health care directly to children from low-income families. Together, we're ensuring that every child receives the support they need for their cognitive, social, and emotional development.

**Geminus Head Start** is more than just an early childhood education program; it's a lifeline for the behavioral and physical health of its students and their families. To complement this, Regional Health Systems offers a specialized program that serves children aged 3 to 5, focusing on identifying and addressing behavioral health issues early—before they enter the traditional school system.

As part of this partnership, Regional Health Systems provides on-site consultations to Head Start staff and teachers, equipping them with the tools to identify students who could benefit from behavioral health services. Following these consultations, students and families can access in-home services and a wealth of resources designed to meet their unique needs. Our team offers classroom training, hands-on support, and family services, ensuring no child's needs go unnoticed.

Additionally, Regional Health Systems and Geminus Head Start staff collaborate to teach Conscious Discipline techniques to identified parents as part of the comprehensive care we provide to children and families. With this support, one parent transformed their relationship with their child. "We noticed a lot of positive changes," shared the Geminus Early Head Start staff. "The parent strengthened their connection with the child, making a real difference."

### Family Preservation: A Strong Partnership for Whole Family Support

At Regional Health Systems, our mission is to empower families to stay together and overcome challenges.

Through our Family Preservation Services program, in partnership with the Indiana Department of Child Services (DCS), we offer crucial support to families at risk of child removal due to abuse, neglect, or safety concerns. What sets us apart is our seamless collaboration with Geminus and its Community Partners Program, creating an integrated network of care that addresses both immediate family needs and long-term stability.

Families receiving services from Regional Health Systems benefit from intensive, in-home interventions such as safety planning, parenting education, and support for issues like substance abuse or domestic violence. Our interventions help create safe, nurturing environments where children can thrive. One parent shared, "I am very grateful for the program; I really see a change in my son, Jarrod. The program is really needed for the youth today."

The partnership with Geminus adds an additional

### A Night with the Stars: Celebrating Community at New Beginnings Clubhouse

New Beginnings Clubhouse, part of Regional Health Systems, continues to expand its mission of empowering individuals living with mental illness at its Merrillville location. As a member-run organization, New Beginnings Clubhouse helps people regain self-worth, purpose, and dignity by offering opportunities to reintegrate into family, employment, education and community life.

Operating on the Clubhouse Model, New Beginnings Clubhouse is more than a mental health service—it's a community where members and staff work side by side to manage the Clubhouse like a business. This unique

approach fosters recovery through meaningful work, allowing members to build skills that promote personal growth and reintegration into society.

On June 21, 2024, members celebrated with the community at the New Beginnings Prom: A Night with the Stars. Planned by the members and for the members, the event featured food, music, a 360-photo booth, and plenty of dancing. Prom-goers dressed in their finest and enjoyed an evening of fun, friendship, and celebration—all while helping to stomp out the stigma surrounding mental illness.

Through events like this prom, New Beginnings Clubhouse reinforces its commitment to creating a sense of belonging and pride, empowering individuals on their recovery journey. The impact of the Clubhouse Model is perhaps best captured in the words of Dashawn P., a long-time member:

"Being a member of New Beginnings Clubhouse has been a transformative experience for me. I have had the opportunity to meet new friends and build my confidence in ways I never thought possible. The Clubhouse Model has equipped me with essential socialization skills and provided valuable resources for employment and education opportunities. The structured daily routine at the Clubhouse has helped me prepare for everyday life scenarios."

At New Beginnings Clubhouse, the focus remains on creating an environment where members can grow, thrive, and feel a sense of purpose as they continue on their path to recovery.

### Celebrating 10 Years of Care: Regional Health Systems Marks a Decade of Primary Care in Northwest Indiana

This year, Regional Health Systems celebrates the 10th anniversary of opening its first Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) in Hammond, a critical milestone in the organization's ongoing mission to meet the healthcare needs of Northwest Indiana. Initially focused on addressing gaps in primary care for individuals with chronic mental illness, the Hammond clinic laid the foundation for Regional Health Systems' expansion. Since then, additional health centers have opened in East Chicago, Merrillville, and a second Hammond location.

In 2016, Regional Health Systems broadened its offerings with the addition of a dental suite, responding to growing community needs for accessible oral healthcare. Now, as the organization marks a decade of providing comprehensive services, it continues to evolve, soon offering mammogram screenings to further support preventative care.

Reflecting on the organization's commitment to access, Regional Health Systems launched a 30-foot mobile health care unit, designed to bring primary care and preventative services directly to underserved communities. "Our new mobile health clinic isn't just a vehicle. It's a symbol of our promise to the community," said Bill Trowbridge, CEO of Regional Health Systems. "A promise that says we're here for you, that we're committed to being part of the solution to better health, wherever and whenever you need us."

**Regional Health Systems' clinics currently serve more than 7,000 patients annually, with 95% residing in Lake County, Indiana.** As Amy Lopez, Executive Director of the Health Clinic and Vice President of Primary Care at Regional Health Systems, explained, "We've always expanded services based on what the community and our patient population need. Bringing care directly to the community helps us reduce barriers so patients can receive the preventative and primary care they need to stay healthy."

As Regional Health Systems celebrates this decade of growth and care, it remains focused on continuing to adapt and expand its services to meet the needs of the communities it serves, ensuring that comprehensive healthcare remains accessible to all.

### FSSA News: Indiana to expand program for expectant, new mothers with substance-use disorders

Indiana will expand its Pregnancy Promise Program to support more expectant and new mothers with substance use disorders. The Indiana Family and Social Services Administration (FSSA) received a three-year, up to \$2.7 million federal grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), which will allow it to support an additional 300 pregnant Hoosiers over the next three years, with a focus on those living in rural and under-resourced communities.

"The program's multigeneration approach supports pregnant women and infants from the prenatal period through 12 months postpartum," FSSA Secretary Dr. Dan Rusyniak said. "Not only are we helping mothers find treatment and sustain recovery, but we



also ensure infants have an established pediatrician, appropriate referrals to pediatric specialists as needed, and developmental support services."

The **Pregnancy Promise Program** has supported more than 900 mothers since it launched in 2021. While maternal and infant mortality rates are decreasing slightly across Indiana, data from the most recent Indiana Maternal Morality Review Committee's annual report shows substance use disorder and overdose continues to be a leading cause of maternal death in the state.

### **REQUEST FOR FUNDING:**

Access to Funding for Certified Recovery Residences

The FSSA's Division of Mental Health and Addiction, is announcing a Request for Funding (RFF) to select providers, certified by the DMHA as Level II, III, or IV Recovery Residences to provide access to funding for room or room and board for those who meet the following criteria: 1) diagnosed with any substance use disorder (SUD); 2) admitted into the Recovery Residence within the last 30 days; and 3) currently receiving outpatient addiction treatment at a DMHA certified treatment facility in the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Level 2.5 or Level 2.1 level of care.

The total amount available for this RFF is \$500,000 for DMHA certified recovery residences for persons who have moved into recovery residences within the past 30 days, currently in an ASAM 2.5 or 2.1 level of care AND have a diagnosis of Substance Use Disorder. The funding source for this RFF is SUPTRS Block Grant funds provided through Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). No awardee will be given an individual award, all awardees will be eligible to bill for these services in the DMHA Electronic Billing Services, not to exceed a total of \$500,000.

### New Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder Parity Rules: What They Mean for Providers

On September 9, 2024, the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and the Treasury released new final rules to strengthen parity between mental health and substance use disorder (MH/SUD) benefits and medical and surgical (M/S) benefits.



The Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act (MHPAEA) prohibits health plans and health insurance companies from imposing greater restrictions on MH/SUD benefits than on M/S benefits. This includes financial requirements such as copays and treatment limitations such as visit limits or prior authorization requirements.

### What do the new rules do?

The new rules better ensure that plans and companies comply with MHPAEA. They also allow providers to obtain more information from these plans and companies about how nonquantitative treatment limitations comply with the requirements.

### When do the new rules take effect?

For patients with group health coverage, the new rules will generally begin to apply on January 1, 2025, though plans and companies will be given until January 1, 2026, to comply with certain new standards. For patients with individual health insurance coverage (i.e., Marketplace), the new protections will generally begin to apply on January 1, 2026.

Although some of the new rules do not take effect right away, MHPAEA and existing regulations still provide protections for patients seeking MH/SUD treatment and will continue to be enforced.

### SAMHSA Announces \$65.7 Million in Prevention, Treatment, and Workforce Enhancement Awards

On Monday, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), announced over \$65 million in grant awards and notices of funding opportunity (NOFO) intended to help address the mental health and substance use crises.

This includes \$27.5 million through the Strategic Prevention Framework – Partnerships for Success (SPF-PFS) program to





help Tribes, state and local governments, and colleges and universities to develop and deliver substance use prevention services. Additional awards aim to help children with unmet behavioral health needs, increase access to behavioral health care for people who are (or are at risk of) becoming unhoused, and enhance the behavioral health workforce by supporting substance use disorder training for graduate-level health care professionals.


